Free Summer Bridge Program Can Improve Your Math Skills

Big! That's the impact that the very first math course you take in college will have on the overall time that it will take you to complete your associate degree, certificate or university transfer requirements. At Foothill College, we'll help you improve your math skills so that you don't waste time, money or energy taking classes that you don't need to graduate or transfer to a university.

Foothill offers you the Summer Bridge Program, the perfect solution if you've taken time off from math during your senior year, or you haven't taken math classes beyond geometry or algebra. The program is free and meets for just two weeks: Aug. 4-14 or Aug. 18-28.

Designed to help you boost your math confidence and brush up on your math skills, the program will help you be better prepared to advance to the next level of math instruction as you work to achieve your educational goals. You'll also prepare for the math placement test in an anxiety-free environment.

Program Eligibility

You're eligible for Summer Bridge if:

- You're a recent high school graduate and enrolling at Foothill for the first time; or
- You've taken the math placement test, and the results placed you in a lower-level math class (MATH 235, 230, 220, 217, 108, 105; NCBS 401 A/B) and you believe that you're capable of doing well in higher-level math courses.

Register Now for the Summer Bridge Program:

1. Get a student identification number (SID) by submitting Foothill's *Application for Admission* at www.foothill.edu/admissions.php. There is no fee to apply. You'll then receive instructions by e-mail to activate your SID and MyPortal.fhda.edu account.
2. Once you have an SID, call Foothill Math Instructor Eric Reed at (650) 949-7091 or e-mail ReedEric@foothill.edu.
3. Take the math placement test before the program begins. Schedule a test appointment at www.foothill.edu/placement.

Elementary Statistics

Learn to be a better consumer of data and information, and complete a degree/transfer requirement by taking Foothill's *MATH 10: Elementary Statistics* course this summer. The course features assignments taken from a variety of professions, including business, medicine, engineering, psychology and sociology.

In addition to learning to use computers to perform statistical calculations, you'll study the collection and presentation of data, probability, hypothesis testing and more. You'll learn to read a graph and conclude what information the graph is conveying. You'll also find out how to distinguish quantitative and qualitative data; sample and population; and descriptive statistics and inferential statistics.

Coming This Fall Biomedical Device Engineering

This fall, Foothill will debut a series of biomedical device engineering courses that are designed to prepare students for entry-level jobs at Silicon Valley companies. You can complete the five-course series and earn a certificate of proficiency in three quarters. You'll study the design and manufacturing of pacemakers, artificial limbs, stents and more.

Prerequisites are not required for the series, which will include introduction to biomedical engineering; design and manufacturing in the biomedical engineering fields; introduction to medical device regulations; introduction to quality assurance; and introduction to documentation. New Students: Get Priority Registration This Fall

Take the Introduction to College Class This Summer

Complete Foothill's 1.5-unit *CNSL 5: Introduction to College* course this summer, and you'll get priority registration and the best selection of classes later this fall. New students (those who have never attended Foothill) are required* to enroll in the orientation class, so it's smart to take it this summer. Choose a *CNSL 5* class that meets in person, is self-paced or meets entirely online. To review course times, access the schedule at www.foothill.edu.

Use summer to take placement tests; meet with a Foothill counselor after you've completed the admission application; register for your classes; and take the *CNSL 5* course this summer.

Start Smart: Take the CNSL 5 Class Now

The *CNSL 5* course gives you an orientation to the programs and services that are available to you at Foothill College. You'll get an overview of California's higher education system, including UC, CSU and private universities, and explore career programs, university transfer options and guaranteed university admission programs. You'll also team up with a Foothill counselor to design your educational plan so that you take the classes that you need to complete your degree, certificate or university transfer requirements.

Follow These Steps to Apply & Register for CNSL 5

1. Apply online at www.foothill.edu/admissions.php. There is no fee to apply.
2. Take the Foothill College placement tests for chemistry, English, English as a second language and/or math. To schedule a testing appointment, access www.foothill.edu/placement/ or call (650) 949-7230. There is no fee for placement testing.
3. Register online for the *CNSL 5* course.
4. Pay fees.

*You may be exempt from *CNSL 5* if you have verifiable proof that you have completed an orientation course at another college, or have completed 30 or more college units.



Associate Degree for Transfer *A Degree with a Guarantee.™*

Foothill College now offers you 11 associate degrees for transfer, a new type of degree that guarantees you priority when you transfer to a California State University campus. The new associate in science for transfer (AS-T) and associate in arts for transfer (AA-T) degrees were developed by the California Community Colleges and California State University systems. Foothill faculty continue to develop more of the transfer degrees, which will debut in upcoming quarters.

Designed specifically for transfer to the CSU, the AA-T and AS-T degrees make it easier for students to transfer between the two higher education systems, and mark the first time in California history that community college students who complete the new degree are guaranteed admission to the CSU system with junior standing. When you complete an AA-T or AS-T, you also receive a special GPA advantage when applying to CSU impacted campuses or majors.

At Foothill, these degrees can be completed with 90 transferable quarter units and include coursework in general education, major preparation and electives.

Starts This Fall

Priority Registration: How to Get It & How to Keep It New State Laws Change Priority Registration

New state laws now require that all California community colleges including Foothill College make significant changes in the assignment of registration priority. The new Student Success & Support Program (3SP) mandate rewards students who make progress toward their educational goals and ensures that classes are available for students who are pursuing job training, completing the associate degree and/or preparing for university transfer.

“The new process will help you determine academic goals early in your college experience,” says Lauren Balducci, Foothill College dean of counseling, admissions and special programs. “You’ll then use these goals to create an education plan that will serve as a guide for selecting courses each quarter. You’ll also team up with a counselor early in your Foothill experience to select the courses that are right for your individual needs.”

Beginning with registration for Foothill’s Fall Quarter, new, fully matriculated* students who have completed orientation *and* assessment, *and* have filed an official education plan, as well as continuing students in good academic standing who have not exceeded 100 units (not including basic English, math or English as a second language) receive registration priority over students who do not meet these criteria. Foothill also awards higher registration priority to continuing and returning students who enroll full time in 12 or more units.

To receive an early registration date, complete these steps:

1. Submit the *Foothill College Application for Admission*. There is no fee to apply. The application and other important admission information is available at www.foothill.edu/admissions.php.
2. Complete a new student orientation session.
3. Take math and English placement tests.
4. Complete the mandatory *CNSL 5* course. During this course, you will complete the required educational plan.
5. Follow up with a counselor to discuss your academic goals, university transfer options, or changes to your education plan.

Students who have earned 150 or more degree-applicable quarter units at Foothill, or who are on academic or progress probation for two consecutive terms will not be permitted to register until other students have had the opportunity to do so.

The new criteria for matriculation and priority registration are part of the Student Success Act of 2012 and comply with California’s Title 5 regulations. They are informed by research on factors that result in student success. The new legislation serves as the cornerstone of the California Community Colleges reform initiative to improve educational outcomes for students and better prepare the workforce needed for California’s economy. It also ushers in some of the most significant improvements to the state’s community college system in more than a decade.

When to Register for Fall Quarter 2014

Foothill College Fall Quarter classes run Sept. 22–Dec. 12, unless otherwise noted in the searchable class schedule at www.foothill.edu. For additional registration dates and student categories, access www.foothill.edu/reg/fall14.php.

July 21–Sept. 21 Continuing students who were enrolled in 12 units or more during Spring Quarter at Foothill College, *and* have selected an education goal of transfer, degree or certificate, *and* have declared an academic major register for fall courses via your MyPortal.fhda.edu account.

July 22–Sept. 21 New, fully matriculated* students register after submitting the online admission application and creating a MyPortal.fhda.edu account. There is no fee to apply.

Get Fit Adapted Physical Education

Foothill’s Adapted Physical Education Program will offer two of its specialized classes this summer, including *PHDA 16: General Conditioning* and *PHDA 20: Functional Fitness*. These one-unit classes feature modified fitness activities, and individual and group instruction.

Adapted physical education courses are ideal if you are starting an exercise routine or if you’re returning to workouts after an injury or surgery (after completing physical therapy). The classes are also a fitness option for students who have developmental disabilities, as well as individuals with chronic conditions such as arthritis, asthma, diabetes and high blood pressure. 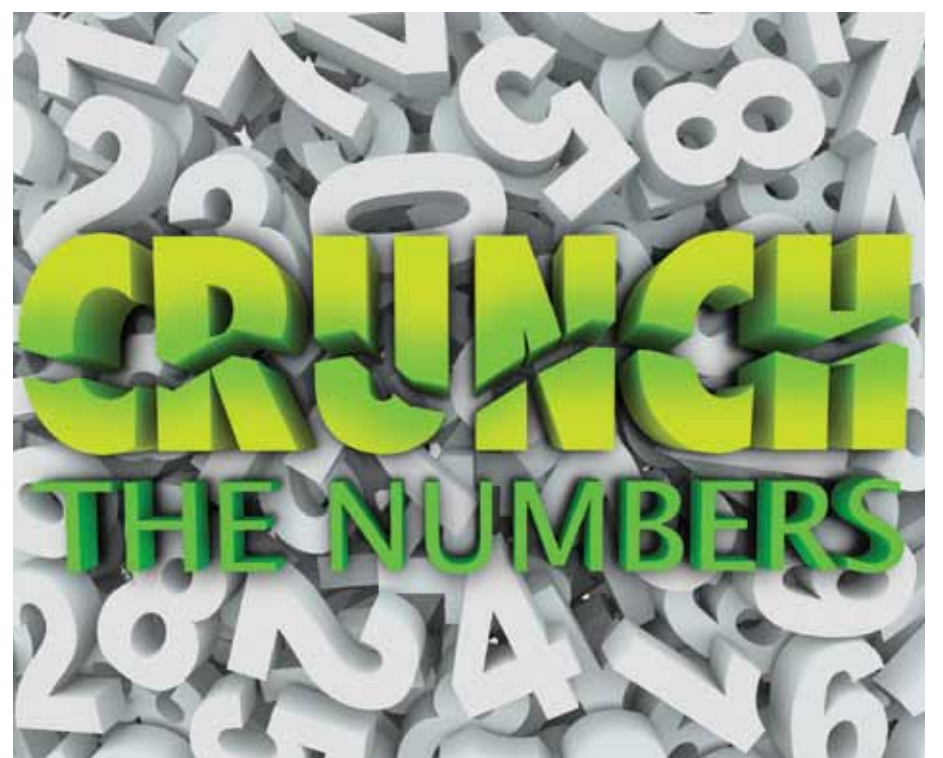
