Year: Students transferring from Contra Costa County community college to four-year colleges

Award: \$4,000

Eligibility: Be of African-American, Latino, Native American, or of Pacific Islander descent, i.e. a minority group underrepresented at four-year colleges and universities in California. Be enrolled for the fall semester prior to the award (or have completed your course work within the past year) at Diablo Valley, Contra Costa, or Los Medanos Colleges. Be eligible (have sufficient and proper units) to transfer to a four-year institution with junior standing for the next fall term (or at the latest the next spring term) following the award. Provide evidence of financial need. Complete and submit on time the application with required attachments. If selected for interview, you MUST attend the Saturday morning Selection Committee interviews in the spring.

Eligibility: Foreign-born, documented financial need, lived in California for 3 or more years of your high school career, anticipated or previous graduation from a Bay Area high school within one of the following nine counties: Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Napa, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Solano, or Sonoma, current or intended enrollment in a two or four-year college or university, demonstrated academic preparation and community or extracurricular involvement, Minimum GPA requirement: 3.3 cumulative high school GPA (For high school students), 2.8 cumulative college GPA (For college students).

Eligibility: The nominee must have graduated from a Napa High School (or be a resident of Napa County and graduated by June from an out of area high school) or completed an equivalent (GED, CHSPE). He/she must have plans to further his/her education or training





within 15 months of receiving the award.

Notes: The nominee must have faced adversity and overcome challenging life circumstances. The nominee must have turned his/her life around or must have maintained high standards in

Award: \$500 - \$1,500

Eligibility: An applicant must be enrolled in college or planning to attend college in the fall. All eligible applicants must live within the PG&E service territory and must be able to provide a copy of a PG&E bill, upon request. The scholarships are awarded based on the information furnished by the applicant and evaluation by the HEA Scholarship Committee. A phone interview may be conducted at the discretion of the HEA Scholarship Committee.

Eligibility: Recipients must be admitted or enrolled in a full-time undergraduate program of study in an accredited four-year college or university in the United States. They must maintain good academic standing and make progress toward a degree.

Notes: The selection committee looks for candidates who value tolerance, compassion and respect for all people in their communities, and who have demonstrated their commitments to these values by their actions.

Eligibility: Chicana/Latina women who have resided for at least two years in one of the listed Northern California counties. Undergraduate Chicana/Latina students must be enrolled as a full-time college student, have completed a minimum of 12 college semester units after high school graduation, and have at least a 2.5 GPA. Graduate students must provide verification of acceptance to a graduate school. Provide undergraduate transcripts. All candidates must have demonstrated leadership and civic/community involvement.

Eligibility: Full-time enrollment at UC Berkeley. Minimum 3.0 unweighted GPA. Gross family income of \$86,000 or less. California resident as defined by the AB 540 guidelines. Submit a UC Berkeley application for Fall 2009/Spring 2010 enrollment. Submit a Statement of Intent to

Register (SIR) to UC Berkeley by June 1.

Must be a **current** UC Davis undergraduate (open to ALL majors). Preferred minimum G.P.A of 2.0 (cannot be in the process of academic dismissal). Must have completed at least one quarter at UC Davis

following seven Bay Area counties: Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, San Francisco, San Mateo,

Santa Clara or Solano, must be able to demonstrate *student* financial need.

Eligibility: Not be a permanent resident or citizen of the USA, be born in a Latin American country, have attended a California high school for all four years, have achieved a superior academic record (minimum academic GPA of 3.7) while taking a challenging academic program, have actively participated in the community through activities that demonstrate community service, leadership and/or talent (e.g., visual or performing arts, math, science, writing, etc.), embody the four core values of Pitzer College (Social Responsibility, Interdisciplinary Learning, Student Autonomy, and Intercultural Understanding).
